Worship Together – Sunday 24th January 2021

At home, in church, inside or outside – God is with us!

Spend a minute or so in silence, listening for God in the sounds that surround us, and allowing His Holy Spirit to make us aware of the fellowship that we have with each other, even though, as with God Himself, we can't see each other. Hear Him say, "I love you".

If you have a Bible to hand, please turn to the book of Jonah (towards the end of the Old Testament), and let us read: Jonah Chapter 3, Verses 1 to 5, and 10 Jonah wasn't keen on obeying God's call for him to go to Nineveh, but after his encounter

nim to go to Nineven, but after his encounter with the big fish, he realised he couldn't avoid it. God's message was simple: "Forty more days and Nineveh will be overthrown." However, getting that message to everyone in that great, but wicked, city was a major undertaking. What would be their reaction?

Let us ask the Holy Spirit to help us to imagine how Jonah felt

... imagine how the Ninevites felt

... understand what God was doing

Let us pray:

Father God, You made us in Your image so that we could have a relationship of love and respect with You. Please forgive us for the ways in which we, as individuals, communities and nations, live only for ourselves and not for Your Kingdom.

We receive the forgiveness that Jesus won for us on the Cross, and ask for Your help to share Your message with those among whom we live.
