Let us read the story of Palm Sunday where the crowd shout declarations about Jesus from Matthew chapter 21:



Jesus Comes to Jerusalem as King

As they approached Jerusalem ... Jesus sent two disciples... to the village ahead...They brought the donkey ... for Jesus to sit on. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and those that followed shouted,

"Hosanna to the Son of David!"

"Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"

"Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Being part of crowd means we can get caught up with others in the moment and join in where others lead.

As we read this familiar passage, let's imagine we are part of that exuberant crowd welcoming Jesus, the itinerant teacher, healer, miracle worker, riding into Jerusalem on a humble donkey. Imagine the branches being torn down, laid in the path of the donkey, laying a 'red carpet' for the King of Kings. Where did those cries honouring and blessing Him come from? Who was it first realised who Jesus was and started loudly acknowledging him as the Son of David, as Saviour? Imagine the impact on the city of the voices from the crowd echoing around the streets of Jerusalem.

Were they thinking of the prophecy from Zechariah which many would have been familiar with? Or were they just caught up in the moment?

Imagine the joy, the hope the wonder of that occasion. Perhaps you have been part of a big worship event, praising God, lifting up your heart, heads and hands in praise, giving glory to Jesus for who He is. Maybe these experiences are a little similar? Praise just bubbles up and has to be expressed to our amazing Lord. The crowd had to honour Jesus with their voices and with what was around them. They lose themselves in praise. In Luke's account of this event, the Pharisees asked Jesus to keep the crowd quiet. But Jesus replied, 'I tell you, if they keep quiet, the stones will cry out.' (Luke 19:40)

Let us echo their cries as we sing or say:

Hosanna, Hosanna in the highest!
Hosanna, Hosanna, Hosanna in the highest!

However, the celebrations in Jerusalem were short lived. What a complete contrast just a few days later when the crowd were given the option by Pilate to free Jesus from arrest. Instead cried, 'Crucify!'

How easily we too can change our responses.

'With the tongue we praise our Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings, who have been made in God's likeness. Out of the same mouth come praise and cursing'.

James 3:9-10
